

THE WALLS REBUILT

Nehemiah 1-6



When God's people were freed from exile, Nehemiah stayed behind in Persia. Nehemiah was the cupbearer to King Artaxerxes. One day, Nehemiah heard that the wall in Jerusalem was broken down and the gates were burned. Nehemiah wept over the sad news. He prayed, "God, please hear my prayer for your people. I confess that we have sinned against you. Please forgive us and give me favor in the eyes of the king as I go to serve him." King Artaxerxes noticed that Nehemiah looked sad and asked him what was wrong. Nehemiah said that he was sad because Jerusalem was in ruins. The king said, "What is your request?" Nehemiah prayed and then said, "Please send me to Jerusalem so that I may rebuild it." The king agreed to this request and provided wood for the building of the temple. When Nehemiah arrived in Jerusalem, he spent time planning what he should do. Then he went to all the people and said, "You see the trouble we are in. Jerusalem lies in ruins. Come, let's rebuild the wall." The

people started building, but Sanballat and Tobiah were not happy. They planned to attack Jerusalem so the building would stop. The people prayed to God and appointed guards to protect them. Each builder carried a weapon with him. They all carried ram's horns to blow if they were attacked, so that other workers would come help them. Then Sanballat and Tobiah started telling lies about the people of God. They said God's people were rebuilding the wall because they planned to rebel against King Artaxerxes. Nehemiah said, "There is no truth to these rumors!" God's people did not allow these enemies to stop them from building. The people completed the wall in 52 days. The nations were amazed, and they knew that the Lord had helped His people.
